Definitions

 Plagiarism- "an idea, expression, plot, or the like, taken from another and used as one's own." (World Book Encyclopedia)

Center for Academic Integrity

 Surveyed High School 4,400 High School students from 25 schools.

McCabe Study Key Results (US)

- 74% of respondents reported one or more instances of <u>serious test cheating</u>.
- 72% reported one or more instances of <u>serious cheating on written work</u>.
- 97% report at least <u>one questionable activity</u> (from copying homework to test copying)
- More than 30% of respondents admit to <u>repetitive</u>, <u>serious cheating on</u> tests/exams
- Yet only 20% agreed with statement, 'Cheating was a serious problem in my high school.'
- **68%** expect less test cheating at university. 19% not sure.

The Internet's Impact

- Availability of information
- Accessibility of information
- Copy and Paste feature

Internet plagiarism

- 15% have submitted a paper obtained in large part from a term paper mill or website
- 52% have copied a few sentences from a website without citing the source
- 90% of the students using the Internet to plagiarize have also plagiarized from written sources. (The Web has 'created' few new cheaters 6% of all students.)

Student excuses

- Lack of knowledge or education
- Lack of time
- Compromised values
- Pressure to perform

Denise Pope-Stanford Professor

- Author of "Doing School: How we are creating a generation of Stressed-out, Materialistic and Miseducated students".
- 75% of all High School students cheat, higher percentage are students who have most to loose (AP or honors students=more pressure).

Consequences

- High Schools (suspension, Honor Board, academic probation, expulsion)
- College (academic probation, course failure, permanent transcrit notation, expulsion)

Detection tools

- Search engines like Google
- Services like Turnitin.com
- Teacher experience

Student education

- Academic perspective (Web quests, paraphrasing exercises, articles, proper ways of composing a bibliography, citing.)
- Ethical and moral approach in our Catholic Schools

Awshley Mouberry-Sieman Study

- Role of teachers is key!
- Educators are responsible for setting the expectations and standards.

Prevention Techniques

- Use multiple versions of an exam
- Do not repeat major assignments from year to year.
- Refrain from assigning "busy work"
- Closely monitor classroom environment
